I am pleased to transmit the annual report of the Philippine
Social Science Council for the Calendar Year 1981. This report
covers PSSC's major accomplishments, regular programs, special
projects, and general financial status.

MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The council has two major accomplishments this year: The visit of the representatives from the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences and the grant from the Japanese government to construct the Philippine Social Science Center.

1.1. The visit of the CASS representatives. Eight scholars from the prestigious Chinese Academy of Social Sciences (CASS) in Beijing, Peoples Republic of China, were guests of the Philippine Social Science Council on 10-24 February 1981. This served as the return visit of the CASS as a result of the trip to China made by 14 PSSC representatives last year.

The scholars were Huan Xiang, Vice-President of CASS, professor at Beijing University, and specialist in world economies and international politics; Sun Yaming, Director of the CASS Institute of Law; Wang Gang, Secretary-General of the delegation and Vice-Director of the Bureau of Foreign Affairs, CASS; Liao Gailong, Research Fellow of CASS and specialist in history of the Peoples Republic of China; Chen Shiwu, Vice-Director of the CASS Institute for Social Sciences Information; Sun Shangquing, Vice-Director of the CASS Institute of Economics; Han Zhenhua,

Associate Research Fellow of Nanyang Institute in Xiamen University; and *Jiang Yiping*, Associate Research Fellow of the CASS Institute of Linguistics.

The scholars had dialogues with various members of the Philippine social science community. They gave lectures on the different aspects of development and modernization; participated in symposia hosted by the University of the Philippines, De La Salle University, Institute of Philippine Culture (Ateneo de Manila University), and Aquinas University in Legazpi City; visited private and government offices; had occasions to meet with the Chinese community in Legazpi City and Manila.

During a meeting between PSSC officials and the CASS delegates a memorandum of agreement was signed providing for the exchange of at least one scholar every year from each country, the exchange of major publications and regular information about the latest programs and activities through correspondence.

The local hospitality was provided by the PSSC and the National Economic and Development Authority. Dinners and luncheon were hosted by some government ministries, private agencies, academic institutions, the Chinese community in Manila and in Legazpi City, and friends of the Council.

1.2. The US\$5.7 million grant from the Japanese government for the Social Science Center. I am happy to inform you that
after almost seven years of negotiations for funds to construct
the Social Science Center, the PSSC was finally awarded a grant

of 1.3 billion yen or US\$5.7 million for the center by the Japanese government last July.

As pledged by Prime Minister Zenko Suzuki of Japan during his visit to the Philippines in January this year, the Government of Japan would donate to the Government of the Philippines three Grant Projects in FY 1981. One of these is for the Philippine Social Science Center. The two others are for the Petrological, Mineralogical and Geochronological Services Laboratory (Ministry of Natural Resources) and the SEAMEO Regional Center for Educational Innovation and Technology (INNOTECH). The total amount of the grant for all three projects will be about US\$15 million.

The Notes on these projects were signed on July 16, 1981 by Hideho Tanaka, Japanese Ambassador to the Philippines, and Manuel Collantes, Acting Minister for Foreign Affairs.

The grant of 1.3 billion yen or \$5.7 million will finance the construction of the Philippine Social Science Center whose function will be to facilitate inter-institutional and multi-disciplinary cooperation among social science organizations.

The proposed Center will provide under one roof adequate facilities and space for PSSC activities and functions. It is also envisioned to become a central location for academic research, information dissemination and cultural activities in the social sciences in the Philippines and neighboring countries.

At present, only the PSSC Secretariat has a permanent office in a small house designed originally as a residence. The

Council rents office space from the University of the Philippines at Diliman, Quezon City. Member organizations hold temporary office wherever the incumbent senior officer has his regular business office.

A land area within the U.P. Diliman campus measuring 8,018,50 square meters more or less has been provided by U.P. as the building site. The site occupies part of a triangle formed by Don Mariano Marcos Avenue, Central Avenue, and the Asian Institute of Tourism (AIT).

The Center will have three storeys above the ground and one partial basement. The principal facilities will comprise the PSSC head office, the Central Subscription Service office, computer room, offices of member and related organizations of the Council, reference library, training and education facilities, auditorium, cafeteria, and others.

To carry out a basic design survey for the establishment of the Center, a team headed by Mr. Kiyoshi Kato, Director of the Grant Aid Department of the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA), was dispatched to the Philippines by the Japanese Government through the JICA and did its survey work [from June 22 to July 12, 1981]. The team comprised the following members: Mr. Masao Takahashi, Mr. Hiroshi Kikucka, Kiyotaka Otani and Mr. Tatsuya Morita, all from the Matsuda, Hirata and Sakamoto, Architects Planners and Engineers, Inc.

The team was followed by a Draft Proposal Confirmation Team which worked in Manila from August 12 to 18, 1981.

The team leader was also Mr. Kato, with Mr. Takahashi and Mr. Kikuoka as members.

The Mission met with representatives of the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA) and the PSSC to discuss the design of the Center, which will be constructed during the early part of 1982.

I would like to give credit to the Social Science

Center Committee for its efforts in seeking the necessary grant

for the center. The PSSC Social Science Center Committee is

2. REGULAR PROGRAMS

2.1. PSSC Research Consortia Program. In line with the Council's aim of encouraging social science research, the PSSC formally launched the Research Consortia Program for 1981 to 1983 in June. It will initially involve 10 centers in the PSSC Research Network. Through collaborative effort, the research capabilities in the provincial centers are expected to be strengthened and research topics linked more directly with the development needs of their areas.

Three consortia groups will be organized during this initial stage of consortia building: Bicol consortium involving

the PSSC research centers in Ateneo de Naga and Aquinas University in Legazpi; Visayas consortium with Central Philippine University in Iloilo City, La Salle College in Bacolod, University of San Carlos in Cebu City and Silliman University in Dumaguete; and the Southeastern Mindanao consortium composed of Ateneo de Davao, Holy Cross College in Digos, Urios College in Butuan, and Notre Dame of Cotabato. In the future, the Council envisions the formation of other consortia involving other centers in the Research Network and other non-PSSC research units in the country.

Local management of the consortia will be encouraged with the formation of their own policy governing body and research committees. Poverty research will be an initial activity, although other research topics viewed as necessary to the regions will also be pursued.

The program will proceed in three phases over a three-year period. Phase One will consist of an assessment of the educational institutions and the centers which will be involved, and an exploration of their needs and plans for future development. Phase Two will be the organizational stage, and Phase Three the operational phase when the consortia will formally start their research undertakings. All three research consortia groups are in phase two.

Lorna P. Makil, the Research Consortia Coordinator,
Pilar R. Jimenez, and Loretta M. Sicat, have visited and conducted

organizational meetings in the various consortia groups. Funding is provided by the Ford Foundation, the Philippine Institute for Development Studies (PIDS), and the International Development Research Centre (IDRC).

2.2. 1981 Research Training Program. The PSSC, in collaboration with the Department of Sociology and Anthropology, Ateneo de Manila University, conducted its 1981 Research Training Program (RTP) for faculty members from selected Philippine universities and colleges from April 20 - May 30, 1981. The site was the Ateneo de Manila University, Loyola Heights, Quezon City, campus.

The training was for those participants who had undergone the PSSC basic+level training program. The courses offered were advanced data analysis and social research report writing.

There were 26 participants. Please refer to Appendix
A for the list of participants and their institutional affiliations.

Esther M. Pacheco of the Ateneo de Manila University Press served as trainor for report writing while Jeanne
Frances Illo of Ateneo de Naga taught data analysis and interpretation. Roberto Salazar of De La Salle University served as a special lecturer. The course coordinators were Pilar R. Jimenez and Lorna P. Makil.

2.3. The Refresher Course for College Social Science

Teachers (RCCSST). This program is intended to update college.

social science teachers with the latest issues and readings in the social sciences. This year's refresher course was organized by the Social Sciences Division of the University of the Philippines in the Visayas (Iloilo City) from April 26 to May 29, 1981. Participants were faculty members from Visayas and Mindanao. Funds to support participants from private institutions were provided by Fund for Assistance to Private Education. The PSSC Executive Director, Loretta Makasiar Sicat, served as guest speaker of the closing ceremonies.

- 2.4. Discretionary Research Awards Program. With financial support from FAPE, the PSSC was able to award 37 DRAP grants to theses and dissertation writers and to proponents of other small research projects. This brings the total to 220 grantees, with 126 completed projects. Please refer to Appendix B for the list of 1981 grantees.
- 2.5. Travel Assistance Awards. This year, 12 social scientists were granted travel assistance awards for their participation in various conferences and workshops abroad.

 Refer to Appendix C for the list of awardees.

There have been, to date, a total of 89 travel assistance awards given to Philippine scholars.

2.6. Conference awards. Four associations, namely the Linguistic Society of the Philippines, the Ugnayang Pang-Aghamtao, the Philippine National Historical Society, the Philippine Political Science Association were this year's recipients of

the seminar awards program. Assistance was provided for the annual conferences of these associations.

- 2.7. Publications Subsidy Program. The NSDB recently released an additional #111,392.14 as part of its five-year subsidy of #1.2 million to the journals of the PSSC member organizations. Despite this subsidy, some journals have not yet been updated.
- 2.8. The Central Subscription Service. The Program continues to market the publications of the Council's member associations and institutions. Its total gross income for the period of 10 months (January October, 1981) amounts to \$\text{948,186.35}\$. Accumulated net earnings as of October 31, 1981 is \$\text{9114,585.50}\$.

This year, the CSS participated in local and foreign publication exhibits. These expositions include (1) Summer Institute in English Language Teaching Phase Three-National Training Program for Improving English Language Teaching Method in the Philippines at the De La Salle University held on April 20 to May 16, 1981; (2) Annual Conference of the Philippine Agricultural Economics and Development Association, Inc. at the Development Bank of the Philippines Building held on June 5, 1981; (3) Asian Studies on the Pacific Coast Conference (ASPAC) held on June 23-24; and the (4) Second International Philippines Studies Conference held on June 27-30, 1981, both held at the Ala Moane Hotel, Honolulu. The CSS Business Coordinator was

sent by PSSC to Honolulu to handle the Philippine Studies Conference. The CSS also sent its publications for exhibit at the Mid-Atlantic Region - Association of Asian Studies, Inc. conference at the University of Maryland held on October 16-18, 1981. Apart from the foregoing the CSS also exhibited its publications in various local conferences and workshops of the Council's member associations and institutions.

SPECIAL PROJECTS

3.1. The third joint PSSC-IDE project on Social Science

Research Activities in the Philippines. The third joint PSSC
Institute of Developing Economies (IDE) research project on

Social Science Research Activities in the Philippines was

completed in March 1981. The research team was composed of the

Wilfrido V. Villacorta, Ruperto P. Alonzo and Ricardo G. Abad went to Tokyo on March 8-15, 1981 for the final discussion meeting with IDE officials and Japanese scholars. The IDE published the research study under its Joint Research Program Series. A copy of this report is available at the PSSC library.

3.2. The Ethnicity and Fertility Project. Since May 1980, the PSSC Research Network has been collaborating with the Institute

of Southeast Asian Studies (ISEAS) in Singapore in a cross-cultural study entitled "Ethnicity and Fertility in Southeast Asia: Field Surveys in Five Countries." The general objective of this research is to investigate through comparable field surveys, the nature and causes of fertility differentials among major ethnic groups in the five ASEAN countries namely, Indonesia, Malaysia, Singapore, Philippines and Thailand.

Fieldwork began in October 1980 and ended in April 1981. In June this year, the senior investigators of the Philippine team, Ma. Cecilia Conaco of the UP Department of Psychology, and Pilar R. Jimenez of the PSSC, attended the second workshop on data analysis in Singapore. The research project is now in the data reduction and analysis phase. The results of the study will be presented in Jakarta, Indonesia in April 1982. The project is expected to be completed in June 1982.

3.3. PSSC-JCIE seminar workshop. A seminar-workshop on
"The Impact of Investment and Trade on Philippine-Japan-ASEAN Relations"
was conducted on July 24, 1981 at the Asian Institute of Management under the joint auspices of the Philippine Social Science
Council and the Japan Center for International Exchange. The
purpose of the workshop was to foster a continuing intellectual
and cultural discourse between Japan and the ASEAN community.

Since 1977, the PSSC has organized similar study groups, the results of which were presented in conferences called the "Asian Dialogue" held in Japan and in Bangkok.

The JCIE was represented by Tadashi Yamamoto in the seminar. The paper readers were the following: On Philippine-Japan Economic Relations: 1) Trade and Development - Romeo B. Bautista (economics) and Wilfrido V. Villacorta (political science); 2) Foreign Investments - Florian Alburo (economics) and Loretta Makasiar Sicat (political science). The discussants for Trade and Development were Jose Leviste, Jr., Deputy Minister of Industry, and Silvino Epistola, Professor, Asian Center, University of the Philippines. The discussants for Foreign Investments were Vicente Valdepeñas, Jr., Deputy Minister of Trade and Edberto Villegas, Professor, De La Salle University.

3.4. The ADC Asian and MUCIA/Nepal Fellowship Programs.

For almost 2 1/2 years now, the PSSC Secretariat has been administering the Agricultural Development Council Asian Fellowship in the Philippines. There are 20 Asian ADC fellows this year. Most of them are taking up graduate studies at the University of the Philippines at Los Baños and at Diliman, Quezon City.

The PSSC has also been administering the Midwest Universities Consortium for International Activities, Inc. (MUCIA) and Nepal Fellowship Project in the Philippines for 1 1/2 years already. Eight Nepalese students are studying at UP Los Baños.

Administrative funds were provided by ADC and MUCIA to PSSC for their fellowship programs. Pilar R. Jimenez and Sylvia V. Tan are the coordinators of these programs.

3.5. Social Science Research Capacity in the Philippines.

From June to November 1981, the PSSC conducted a project which assessed the present level of social science research capacity in the Philippines. The project was sponsored by The World Bank.

The project had two specific objectives: 1) to compile/collate a bibliography of previous or completed research reports in the Philippines during the last five years (1976-1980) in the various disciplines the PSSC currently serves; and 2) to make a directory of social science researchers actively engaged in research from 1976 to the present.

The coordination of the entire project was undertaken by the Executive Director. The 13 discipline representatives of the PSSC Research Committee served as consultants in their respective disciplines. The project was completed in November 1981.

3.6. PSSC-UP Law Center seminar-workshop on women. The Philippine Social Science Council in collaboration with the University of the Philippines Law Center hosted a seminar-workshop on Development Planning and the Roles and Status of Women in the Philippines on September 10-11, at the Asian Institute of Tourism in Diliman, Quezon City. Financial support was provided by the Population Council in Bangkok, Thailand.

Placido V. Mapa, Jr., newly appointed Director-General of the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA), delivered the keynote address during the opening ceremonies. Academicians and representatives of some government ministries and non-government

agencies participated in the activity.

The seminar-workshop covered conceptual, measurement and policy issues on the role and status of women in the country. Conceptual and measurement issues were presented in a General Plenary Session on the first day. Simultaneous sessions on sectoral topics were presented in the afternoon of the first day and in the morning of the second day.

The workshop proceedings are in press and will be disseminated before the end of the year.

3.7. Fourth AASSREC Conference. The Fourth Association of Asian Social Science Research Councils (AASSREC) conference was held in Bangkok, Thailand on October 19 to 24, 1981. The themes were "Challenges to the Social Sciences in the 1980's: Professionalization of the Social Sciences in Asia," and "Urbanization in Asia."

Loretta Makasiar Sicat, the PSSC Executive Director and Vice-President of AASSREC, and Ernesto M. Pernia represented the Council in this activity. Loretta Makasiar Sicat presented PSSC's activities since the last AASSREC conference in Manila in 1979 as well as the tasks and challenges as perceived by the Philippine social science community while Ernesto M. Pernia read a paper entitled "Asian Urbanization and Development: A Cross-country Perspective."

3.8. First IFSSO General Conference. On November 23 to 26, 1981, Loretta Makasiar Sicat and Andrew B. Gonzalez will

represent the PSSC during the First General Conference of the International Federation of Social Science Organizations in Paris, France. The theme of the general conference is "The Social Sciences on the Threshold of the Eighties." The PSSC is one of the founding members of IFSSO.

4. FINANCES

A separate detailed financial report will be presented by the Secretary-Treasurer:

Let me, however, briefly state that the Council continues to receive major support from the following funding agencies:

The National Science Development Board for the Council's

Publications Subsidy Program for five-year grant of around

#240,000 per year starting in 1979 to 1983. This fund is intended to subsidize the journals of our regular member associations.

The Fund for Assistance to Private Education for the three year grant of the PSSC Discretionary Research Awards Program, the Summer Refresher Course for College Social Science Teachers, and the Annual local conferences, seminars and workshops of our member organizations.

The Ford Foundation through the assistance of the last
Associate Representative in Manila, John Cool, recently awarded
US\$110,000 for the administration of the Research Consortia
Program. It also allowed the Council to utilize the unused
remaining Ford grant to PSSC for the 1981 Research Training Program.

Recently, the *International Development Research Centre* approved a grant of \$100,000 for the research component of the Research Consortia Program. This is the first time IDRC is funding a PSSC program.

The Philippine Institute for Development Studies has also awarded a three-year grant to PSSC to conduct poverty studies, amounting to about #450,000. This fund will be utilized by the various consortia groups in their consortia projects.

The National Economic and Development Authority has helped us tremendously in securing the grant for the Social Science Center. Its endorsement of the Center to the Japanese government and the assistance and advice provided by its officials and staff to the Council facilitated the award of US\$5.7 million. It should also be mentioned that we are grateful for NEDA's support in helping us host the delegation of CASS representatives who visited us last February.

Project funds were provided by the following to enable the Council to carry out special projects:

The Institute of Developing Economies for the joint project on Social Science Research Activities in the Philippines;

The Japan Center for International Exchange for the Asian Dialogue;

The World Bank for the project on Social Science Research Capacity in the Philippines;

The Institute of Southeast Asian Studies for funding

and organizing Ethnicity and Fertility Project in Southeast Asia.

As a whole the financial status of the Council is sound. The endowment fund and other program funds are properly invested through well-selected investment houses. There will probably be a need for us to utilize part of our endowment fund earnings to start and maintain the PSSC Social Science Center until such time when it will become self-liquidating.
