*I am pleased to transmit the annual report of the Philippine Social Science Council for Calendar Year 1983. This report covers PSSC's major accomplishments, regular programs, special projects and general financial status.*

## **I. MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

This year, the Council has two major accomplishments: the operation of the *Philippine Social Science Center* and the holding of a seminar-workshop on the proposed *Philippine Social Science Information Network* and a review of the *PSSC Agenda for the '80s*.

1.1. *The Philippine Social Science Center.* The decade-long quest for a home and a sanctuary of, and for, the social sciences culminated with the completion, the turn-over and the inauguration of the *Philippine Social Science Center (PSSCenter)*.

On March 21, the *Turn-Over Ceremony* took place at the Center's impressive *Eufonio M. Alip* auditorium. The officers of the *Taisei Corporation* formally handed over the Center's keys, as-built drawings and guarantees, among others, to the UP and the PSSC.

*Japanese Minister Nagao Hyodo* delivered the turn-over remarks while *Dr. Oscar M. Alfonso*, UP Executive Vice-President, representing UP President *Edgardo J. Angara*, delivered the acceptance remarks. *Dr. Leslie E. Bauzon*, Chairman of the PSSC Executive Board, delivered the opening remarks.

*Dr. Mercedes B. Concepcion*, Founding Chairman of the PSSC Executive Board, presented plaques of appreciation to *Matsuda, Hirata and Sakamoto Architects, Engineers and Planners, Taisei Corporation*

and *Amalgamated Project Management Services, Inc.* as well as to Architects *Masao Takahashi, Tetsuhito Sato and Enrique Dizon* and Engineers *Keiji Ishikawa and Yuzo Echikawa*. *Dr. Sylvia H. Guerrero*, Vice-Chairman of the PSSC Executive Board, was master of ceremonies.

Immediately after the turn-over, the PSSC Secretariat started its transfer to the new building which is to be the center of interinstitutional and interdisciplinary cooperation among various social science institutions and organizations.

May 16 marked the most awaited *inauguration* of the PSSC Center with *Prime Minister Cesar E.A. Virata* as principal guest of honor. Also gracing the occasion was *Madame Gloria M. Angara*, wife of UP President *Edgardo J. Angara*, who presided over the cutting of the ceremonial ribbon with the assistance of *Dr. Loretta Makasiar Sicat*, PSSC Executive Director, *Ambassador Yoshio Okawa* of Japan delivered a speech and assisted Prime Minister Virata in the unveiling of the marker.

True to PSSC's nonsectarianism, two of the UP Chaplains, namely, *Rev. Fr. Manuel Gabriel* of the Parish of the Holy Sacrifice and *Rev. Oscar Suarez* of the Church of the Risen Lord delivered a joint ecumenical invocation. *Dr. Leslie E. Bauzon*, Chairman of the PSSC Executive Board delivered the opening remarks while *Dr. Oscar M. Alfonso*, UP Executive Vice-President (on behalf of UP President Angara), delivered a message. *Dr. Cristina P. Parel*, PSSC founding member, also delivered a message. Another founding member and current discipline representative for psychology in the Executive Board, *Fr. Jaime C. Bulatao*, introduced the Prime Minister.

*Dr. Gerardo P. Sicat*, Chairman of the Philippine National Bank, honored the occasion with his presence. He received a special

award during the 1982 PSSC Annual Meeting for his contributions toward the upliftment of the social sciences in the country. *Dr. Armand V. Fabella* acted as master of ceremonies.

The UP Concert Chorus rendered a splendid performance under the baton of *Prof. Rey Paguio* of the UP College of Music. As a culminating activity, the guests were toured around the building and were treated to a warm reception.

The three-storey edifice houses the PSSC Secretariat, the Central Subscription Service, the Library and the offices of the twelve regular member associations. Twenty-two rooms in the third floor have been rented out to social science-related outfits. There is also a Cafeteria which began operations last October 17.

As a central location for academic research, information dissemination and other related activities in the Philippines and in the neighboring countries, various PSSCenter facilities are being made available for such purposes. These include the auditorium, the seminar room, the training rooms, the conference room, and the data processing room.

A special feature of the Center are the barrier-free structures such as the ramps at the front and rear entrances, a combination elevator-dumb waiter and comfort rooms with railings to suit the mobility needs of disabled persons. For such ingenuity and evidence of concern, PSSC received the *International Symbol of Access Award* from the National Commission Concerning Disabled Persons under the office of the Ministry of Social Services and Development. The simple awarding rites took place on July 22 at the seminar room with the officers of the PSSC Executive Board and the Executive Director in attendance.

With the PSSCenter now standing as the hallmark of social science advancement, a herculean task awaits the Council, for a new stage in its growth as an institution has just begun.

To all those who have assiduously worked towards the realization of this dream, CONGRATULATIONS!!!

1.2. *Seminar-Workshop on the PSSC Agenda for the '80s and on the PSSC Infonet.* In response to clamors from the social science community for PSSC to review its programs, the PSSC Executive Board created an Ad Hoc Committee to work out plans toward this end.

Thus, on November 16, the PSSC held a seminar-workshop on its *Agenda for the '80s and on the Philippine Social Science Information Network* in the Mercedes B. Concepcion Seminar Room. Dr. Cesar M. Mercado, PSSC Secretary-Treasurer, coordinated the activity.

Representatives from the PSSC regular and associate members and those from the PSSC research network units participated in the whole day activity. [Please see Appendix B for the list of participants.]

Dr. Leslie E. Bauzon, Chairman of the Board and of the Ad Hoc Committee welcomed the participants. Dr. Sylvia H. Guerrero, PSSC Vice-Chairman briefed them on the objective and the expected outputs. Some background information on the PSSC Agenda for the '80s were given by Dr. Wilfrido V. Villacorta, former PSSC Chairman, Dr. Cesar M. Mercado presented his brainchild, the PSSC Infonet, and also acted as moderator during the open forum and the plenary session. PSSC Executive Director, Dr. Loretta Makasiar Sicat, delivered the closing remarks.

In the afternoon, the participants were divided into workshop groups by region: Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao. Guide questions on the Agenda for the '80s and the PSSC Infonet were provided to facilitate their discussions. Answers to these questions and their respective recommendations were presented during the plenary session.

Generally, the participants agreed to endorse the two directions to be given emphasis in the PSSC Agenda for the '80s which are research dissemination and advocacy. They also responded positively to the PSSC Infonet proposal pending consultation with their respective university/college presidents. Hence, questionnaires will be sent out to confirm and/or reaffirm their formal commitment to the project.

## 2. REGULAR PROGRAMS

2.1. *PSSC Research Consortia Program.* In accordance with its Agenda for the 1980s, the Philippine Social Science Council, Inc. (PSSC) launched its Research Consortia Program in June 1981 to promote quality and relevant research in the country. Receiving funding support from the Ford Foundation for its organization and start-up phase and equivalent funding from the Philippine Institute for Development Studies (PIDS) and the International Development Research Centre (IDRC) for its project implementation phase, the program is envisioned to strengthen and upgrade the research capability of provincial research centers by providing opportunities for collaborative research among centers which are regionally proximate to each other. Research efforts will also be linked up effectively with development plans in the regions by involving key persons from various development agencies

in the consortia mechanism.

Following an assessment and preliminary evaluation of research centers in June 1981, three regional consortia groups started operations in January 1982. These groups are now known as the Eastern Mindanao Area Research Consortium, the Visayas Research Consortium, and the Bicol Research Consortium. All the consortia have the presidents of the participating universities, the PSSC executive director, and the vice-chairmen of the government's Regional Development Council as well as regional representatives from some other government agencies, on their Governing Boards.

2.1.1. *The Eastern Mindanao Area Research Consortium (EMARC).* The Eastern Mindanao Area Research Consortium was formally established on January 8, 1982 upon the signing of a Memorandum of Agreement between the Philippine Social Science Council and four Mindanao-based academic institutions, namely, Ateneo de Davao University (Davao City), Holy Cross College of Digos (Davao del Sur), Notre Dame University (Cotabato City), and Urios College (Butuan City). Fr. Jose R. Arong (President of Notre Dame University) was elected Chairman of the EMARC Governing Body, with Ms. Teresita N. Angeles (Director of Ateneo de Davao Social Research Office) as EMARC Coordinator. In June 1982, Fr. Emeterio J. Barcelon (President of Ateneo de Davao University) was elected Chairman in lieu of Fr. Arong whose term of office as university president had expired.

Since its establishment, the EMARC has pursued a range of research-related activities in its effort to promote local expertise in conducting socioeconomic and cultural research relevant



to the development needs of the region. Such areas of mutual cooperation and assistance among the consortium members include designing and conducting a joint research project on poverty, participating in various short-term training/workshops during the project implementation phase, and designing a graduate program in applied social research for faculty and staff development.

*The EMARC Research Project*

The project entitled "A Multipurpose Survey of Fishing Villages in Eastern Mindanao" addresses itself to rural poverty. It focuses on the socio-psychological and economic realities confronting 400 fishermen-households located in four fishing villages in Mindanao.

The survey report contains the individual profiles of the four fishing villages and covers such variables as household characteristics, fishing activities, awareness and attitude toward government assistance, organizational participation and fishermen's needs, aspirations and perceptions. A final section integrating the individual profiles is similarly prepared.

The results of this initial poverty research project will be presented in a conference at the Philippine Social Science Center where the other two research consortia groups will also be presenting their respective results. As an initial presentation, the EMARC has sponsored a seminar with key government agencies in the region where research results were disseminated.

Tentative plans for the second EMARC research project consist of secondary research utilizing the existing data set on fishing villages. These will hopefully result in a series of research papers developed from the initial study. Research participants may

already include the grantees of the ongoing EMARC faculty development program.

2.1.2. *The Visayas Research Consortium (VRC).* The Visayas Research Consortium was formally established on November 20, 1981. Four research centers of leading academic institutions in the Visayas (University of San Carlos in Cebu, Silliman University in Dumaguete, Central Philippine University in Iloilo and La Salle College in Bacolod) constitute the consortium. Fr. Gregorio Pizarro, SVD (President of the University of San Carlos) acted as Chairman of the VRC Governing Body with Dr. Violeta Lopez-Gonzaga (Director of La Salle College Social Research Office) as VRC Coordinator. In May 1982 Fr. Florante S. Camacho succeeded Fr. Pizarro as President of the University of San Carlos and as Chairman of the VRC Governing Body.

In its brief existence as a research organization the VRC has already shown its research and administration capabilities in several ways. On its first year of operations, it undertook four studies with theoretical import and implications for policy-making. It also sponsored various workshops and training programs aimed to generate local expertise in socioeconomic research and designed to equip junior researchers with skills necessary to produce quality research.

#### *The VRC Project*

For its pioneer project, the VRC undertook an investigation on the nature of poverty in the Visayas with the end in view of providing a comprehensive understanding of the regional dimensions of poverty in the country and, more importantly, of providing inputs

to policy. The research addresses itself to four livelihood-based, poorest-among-the-poor groups in the region covering such variables as household characteristics, mobility patterns, coping mechanisms and strategies for survival, perceptions and responses to technological change. The studies produced are the following:

"Poverty Structure and Dynamics: The Case of Artisanal Fishermen in the Province of Iloilo"

- Central Philippine University (CPU)

"Mechanization and Labor Employment: A Study of the Sugarcane Workers' Responses to Technological Change in Sugar Farming in Negros"

- La Salle College (LSC)

"Scavengers of Cebu City: A Case of Urban Poverty"

- University of San Carlos (USC)

"Poverty in the Upland: Lowland Migrant Swiddeners in the Balinsasayao Forest, Negros Oriental"

- Silliman University

All these four studies are part of the broader collaborative research entitled, "Faces of Poverty in the Visayas: A Cross-Livelihood Study."

The VRC also envisions being a key agent in the dissemination of significant findings from the project studies through publications, seminars and conferences with private academic and government sectors. In Negros Occidental, for instance, findings on the study of the mechanization of sugarcane farming have been briefly presented to such key sectors in the industry as the labor sector, the planters and the Ministry of Labor.

To date, plans are underway for the second project which

will focus on the Floating Mass/Migrant Workers in the Visayas.

2.1.3. *The Bicol Research Consortium (BREC).* The Bicol Research Consortium operationally came into effect in April 1982 upon the signing of a Memorandum of Agreement between the participating institutions. There are two research centers in the consortium: the Ateneo de Naga Research and Service Center and the Aquinas University Research Bureau. For an effective tie-up between consortium research and development efforts in the region, four development agencies are involved: the National Economic and Development Authority, the Commission on Population, the Ministry of Education, Culture and Sports and the Ministry of Social Services and Development. *Fr. Manuel Piñon* (President of Aquinas University) is Chairman of the BREC Governing Body with *Ms. Jeresha Meneses-San Jose* (Head of Aquinas University Research Bureau) as local coordinator.

*The BREC Project*

On its first year of operation, the Bicol Research Consortium organized a consultative session with technical experts in the region to draw up a research plan for action. In view of the fact that Bicol stands out in terms of the incidence of poverty despite government efforts to channel integrated rural development programs in the area, BREC decided to focus its attention on socioeconomic problems confronting several farmer-households in the region. The BREC study entitled "The Cost of Borrowing of Selected Farmers in Camarines Sur and Albay" focuses itself on the role of agricultural credit in increasing production and farmers' income in Bicol. Specifically, it seeks to find out credit cost, credit practices of the



farmers, credit resources, and the role of formal and informal credit markets. It hopes to advance recommendation for the formulation of a more effective credit policy for integration into rural development programs. To date, the study is in its completion stage.

2.2. *Discretionary Research Awards Program (DRAP)*. With continued financial support from the Fund for Assistance to Private Education (FAPE), thesis grants were awarded to eight successful applicants. To date, there are 241 grantees and 155 completed research projects. More grants are expected to be awarded as soon as the Research Committee convenes in December. [Please refer to Appendix A for the list of 1983 grantees.]

2.3. *Conference Awards*. This year's recipients of the conference grants were the *Linguistic Society of the Philippines*, the *Ugnayang Pang-Aghamtao* (Anthropological Association of the Philippines) and the *Philippine Sociological Society*. Total financial assistance amounted to ₱25,900. This program is also being sponsored by FAPE.

2.4. *Publications Subsidy Program*. The National Science and Technology Authority (NSTA) released the amount of ₱160,000 as its publications subsidy for this year. It did not, however, release its 1982 allocation due to unavailability of funds.

With the five-year subsidy worth ₱1.2 million ending this year, negotiations are underway regarding the release of the 1982 allocation.

The subsidy has considerably helped the publication of

the journals of PSSC's member associations which otherwise would not have seen print. Hopefully, another grant for a longer term will be settled for the proper dissemination of research findings in the social sciences.

2.5. *The Central Subscription Service (CSS).* The Program continues to market the publications of the Council's member associations and institutions. Other than these the CSS also sells the publications of the following institutions and publishers: Asian Center, Ateneo Press, Integrated Research Center, De La Salle University, International Rice Research Institute, National Economic and Development Authority, New Day, Summer Institute of Linguistics, UP Law Center, and UP Press. The total gross income for nine months (January-September 1983) has amounted to ₱63,719.08. The accumulated net earnings as of September 30, 1983 has amounted to ₱202,221.50.

The CSS had a month-long inaugural sale at the Center. It also participated in local conferences. These expositions include the following: International Economic Association-Federation of ASEAN Economic Associations Regional Conference, Social Work Regional Conference, Linguistic Congress of the Philippines, and the Sociological Conference. Apart from the abovementioned conferences the CSS exhibits its publications in the functions being held at the Center such as the Linguistic Society of the Philippines Annual Conference, the Psychological Association of the Philippines Membership Meeting, the Conference on Higher Education, the First National Social Science Congress, the 9th International Association of Historians of Asia Conference, and the Philippine Association of Social Workers Biennial Conference.

Since one of the functions of the CSS is to update subscribers of the journals, letters were sent to individual/institutional subscribers reminding them of their subscription.

### 3. SPECIAL PROJECTS

3.1. *The First National Social Science Congress.* Another major event which took place at the PSSCenter this year was the First National Social Science Congress (FNSSC).

As early as May until September, roundtable discussions were held to identify major issues and appropriate recommendations to be taken up during the Congress. The topics discussed were: (1) An Evaluative Review of Social Science in the Philippines; (2) An Assessment of Social Science Structures in the Philippines; (3) Contemporary Social Science Policies and Programs: *Instruction*; (4) Contemporary Social Science Policies and Programs: *Research*; (5) Contemporary Social Science Policies and Programs: *Extension*; (6) Human Resource Development and Institution Building; and (7) Social Science Research Dissemination and Utilization.

The roundtable coordinators were Dr. Olivia C. Caoili, Dr. Sylvia H. Guerrero, Dr. Manuel F. Bonifacio, Dr. Alejandro N. Herrin, Dr. Patricia B. Licuanan, Bro. Andrew B. Gonzalez, and Prof. Felipe B. Miranda, in that order. Dr. Cesar M. Mercado was the Chairman of the Roundtable Coordinators' Committee.

The Overall Chairman of the Congress was Dean Ofelia R. Angangco of the UP College of Arts and Sciences. Dr. Loretta Makasiar Sicat, PSSC Executive Director and Professor of Political

Science, UP, was the Co-Chairman.

The three-day activity started from November 17 to 19. UP President Edgardo J. Angara delivered the keynote address. Delegates from educational institutions, business and industrial sectors, professional and civic organizations and government institutions attended the Congress.

In line with the theme, *Towards Excellence in Social Science in the Philippines*, new directions to further strengthen social science in the country were formulated. Concrete recommendations for more relevant policies, programs, projects and activities were made in order to develop Philippine social science and ultimately, the Filipino.

Sponsors of the Congress were the UP Diamond Jubilee Commission, the National Science and Technology Authority, the UP Division of Social Sciences (College of Arts and Sciences), the International Honor Society of Pi Gamma Mu, the National Research Council of the Philippines, the Fund for Assistance to Private Education, and the Philippine Social Science Council, Inc.

3.2. *The 9th IAHA Conference.* Following the FNSSC, the 9th International Association of Historians of Asia (IAHA) Conference was held at the PSSCenter from November 21 to 25.

Participants in the Conference were eminent local and foreign historians actively engaged in research on the historical as well as the contemporary aspects of Asian culture and society.

Traditionally, the IAHA Conferences have been the world's foremost forum for the presentation of new findings in the study of Asian history. The Conferences are held every three years.



The panel discussions were guided by the following sections:

(1) Recent Trends in Philippine Historiography; (2) Major Themes of Study in Asian History; (3) Problems of Methodology in the Study of Asian History; and (4) Special Topics in Asian History.

*Dr. Leslie E. Bauzon*, PSSC Chairman and Professor of History, University of the Philippines is the current IAHA President. The Conference Secretariat is the Business Resource Center, Inc.

The sponsoring agencies for this year's conference are the University of the Philippines, the Filipinas Foundation, Inc., the Philippine Social Science Council, Inc., the Philippine Historical Association and the Philippine National Historical Society.

3.3. *The ADC/Asian, MUCIA/Nepal and the WSU/Indonesian Fellowship Programs.* Since 1979, PSSC has been commissioned to administer the *Agricultural Development Council (ADC) Asian Fellowship*. In 1980, the same services were requested by the *Mid-west Universities Consortium for International Activities, Inc. (MUCIA)*. The latest addition to this kind of project, the *Washington State University (WSU) Fellowship Program*, offers scholarships to selected Indonesian participants funded by the Eastern Islands Agricultural Education Project.

All grantees under these fellowship programs are pursuing their graduate studies at major Philippine universities namely, University of the Philippines in Diliman, the Visayas, and Los Baños, Ateneo de Manila University, De La Salle University, and Xavier University in Cagayan de Oro City.

There are 17 Asian ADC fellows this year. MUCIA and WSU

have six fellows each.

For all three programs, administrative funds are provided by their respective agencies to PSSC.

3.4. *External Linkages.* PSSC is a member of two international social science organizations, namely, the Association of Asian Social Science Research Councils (AASSREC) and the International Federation of Social Science Organizations (IFSSO).

The Fifth Biennial AASSREC Conference is scheduled on December 4-10 in Sydney, Australia. PSSC delegated *Dr. Sylvia H. Guerrero* and *Prof. Ponciano L. Bennagen* vice-chairman and member of the Executive Board, respectively to represent the Council in the Conference. They will present a paper on the indigenization of the social sciences.

#### 4. FINANCES

The *National Science and Technology Authority (NSTA)*, the *Fund for Assistance to Private Education (FAPE)*, the *Ford Foundation (FF)*, the *International Development Research Centre (IDRC)*, the *Philippine Institute for Development Studies (PIDS)*, and the *National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA)* continue to give financial support for the operation of the Council's programs. The *Asia Foundation* is funding the travel expenses of the PSSC delegates to the AASSREC Biennial Conference.

Attached are the Financial Statements and Supplementary Schedules for the month period ended September 30, 1983 and the Auditor's Report.

More funds on a longer term basis are expected to be generated to carry out PSSC programs and projects as well as to maintain the Philippine Social Science Center.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

SEPTEMBER 30, 1983

NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION

The Philippine Social Science Council, Inc. (PSSC) is a National Science and Technology Authority certified non-stock, non-profit, scientific-cultural-educational organization and is exempt from income tax pursuant to Section 27 (e) of the Tax Code and Section 24 of Republic Act No. 2067 as amended by Republic Act No. 3589, provided no part of the income will inure to the benefit of any individual or stockholder.

Its operations are funded by grants and donations from the Ford Foundation, National Science and Technology Authority, National Economic and Development Authority, Institute of Development Research Center, Fund for Assistance to Private Education and various civic, educational, scientific, cultural and business organizations.

NOTE 2 - GENERAL PROGRAM SECRETARIAT

The Secretariat acts as the working arm of the Council. Operating funds are provided by earnings derived from income of the endowment fund.

NOTE 3 - CENTRAL SUBSCRIPTION SERVICE

The Central Subscription Service (CSS) is a program of the Council. It was established to assist the Council member associations in the publication of their journals and other social science books and monographs through centralized management and distribution.

NOTE 4 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting - The accounts of the organization are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting to insure the observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the organization. Resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes, into funds established according to their nature and purpose, thus maintaining separate accounts for each fund.

The Council follows the accrual basis of accounting for its transactions.

Inventories - Inventories are valued at cost as determined by first-in, first-out (FIFO) method.

Property and Equipment - Property and equipment are stated at cost. Depreciation is computed on a straight-line method based on the estimated useful lives of the assets.

NOTE 5 - ENDOWMENT FUND

This account represents a grant made by the Ford Foundation of US \$200,000.00 to the Council and matched on a one to one basis by the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA) by contributing ₱1,500,000.00 to the fund.

The amount donated by the Ford Foundation was converted at the banks buying rate of ₱7.33 to US \$1.00 or ₱1,466,000.00.

The grant provides among other things, that only the earnings of the principal fund will be utilized for the operation of the Secretariat. The Council availed of the Services of Private Development Corporation of the Philippines and Ayala Investment and Development Corporation to act as Investment Managers of the Fund.

NOTE 6 - PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

Acquisition and improvements are charged to property accounts while expenditures for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred.

NOTE 7 - ADMINISTRATIVE FEES

These represent fixed fees allocated by the Agricultural Development Council, Midwest Universities Consortium for International Activities, Inc. and Washington State University to the Secretariat.

NOTE 8 - PSSC BUILDING COMPLEX

On July 16, 1981, a grant was extended by the Government of Japan to the Philippine Government under the Exchange of notes signed by both governments, establishing the PSSCenter.

On December 14, 1981, a memorandum of agreement was made between the University of the Philippines System and the Philippine Social Science Council, Inc. whereby the university authorized PSSC to construct within the University's Campus its building complex in an area consisting of 8,018.50 square meters under such terms and conditions mutually agreed by both parties.

The buildings, facilities and equipment of PSSC shall be used for its programs and activities for as long as PSSC exists and determines that such buildings, facilities and equipments are needed and thereafter ownership of the same shall be transferred to the University provided that they be used solely for educational purposes.

The building complex was turned over by the Government of Japan to the Council on March 21, 1983.
