





Congratulations to all on the occasion of our Silver Jubilee!




### The Philippine Social Science Council:

### A SILHOUETTE

n March 18, 1968, eight prominent social scientists representing eight different social science associations gathered for lunch at the Blue Room of the Ateneo de Manila University at Padre Faura, Ermita, Manila, to elect the first set of officers of the Philippine Social Science Council (PSSC). This marked the formal launching of a new organization, a structural reflection of a vision revived exactly one year and fifteen days earlier, by Dr. Estefania Aldaba-Lim, a social scientist in her own right and at that time Chairman of the UNESCO National Commission of the Philippines (UNACOM/Philippines) Committee on Social Science, who must have witnessed the birth of the organization with understandable pride and satisfaction. Never mind that PSSC was not exactly what she originally had in mind a National Social Science Council of the Philippines under the wings of UNACOM/Philippines. The important thing was that a social science council, then a novelty in the Philippine context, had been formed to promote and enhance the development of the social sciences in the Philippines, upgrade their associations, hone their members' research skills and thereby enabling them to be of greater service, individually and collectively, to the country.

The founders of PSSC displayed infectious enthusiasm, imagination and capacity for hard work, not only in firming up its organization and mechanisms, but especially in framing a plan of action or blueprint to operationalize PSSC's mission. This convinced prospective funding agencies, such as The Asia Foundation, Ford Foundation, National Science Development Board, and even the Fund for Assistance to Private Education, to support PSSC's operations and programs; UNACOM/Philippines provided initial working space. The Ford Foundation was most generous, contributing almost two million pesos for PSSC's developmental activities and Secretariat operations during the first five years of assistance to the social sciences (1972-1977). This generosity was capped by a \$200,000 contribution to PSSC's endowment fund in 1977, which the Philippine Government generously matched with an equal amount even as PSSC remained a private, non-



governmental entity. The endowment assured the continuity of the PSSC Secretariat's operations, independent of the vagaries of yearly donor contributions.

The PSSC was just as lucky in its search for a permanent home. The University of the Philippines donated space on its sprawling Diliman campus along Commonwealth Avenue on which now stands the three-storey concrete PSSCenter, the construction of which was made possible with a grant aid by the Japanese Government to the Philippine Government. A frenetic construction activity but under the rigid supervision by a Japanese firm made possible the Center's completion in record time. Finally, on May 16, 1983, slightly more than twenty years after PSSC's actual launching, the PSSCenter was formally inaugurated and, with it at long last, the heretofore wandering Council - and its member associations — had a place they could call a home and their own.

PSSC's intrinsic nature and missionobjective have remained constant through the years. Its functions or duties, however, have expanded in its quest for national relevance and in the process practically modifying, if not changing PSSC's mission and nature. I quote, for example, the PSSC "Agenda for the 1980's" for PSSC's nature and objective:

The Philippine Social Science Council is a nonstock, nonprofit nongovernmental organization of professional social science associations geared towards the consolidation of Philippine social science resources. It hopes to enhance the impact of Filipino social scientists on national development, and to formulate policies, programs, and projects to achieve this end.

Among the measures with which it undertakes to achieve PSSC purposes are, in addition to the usual tasks expected of associations insofar as the associations and individual members' interests are concerned, the following:

To offer to the government, business and other sectors (of society) assistance in social science research and education, policy formulation, & program development.

To develop, stimulate, support, or encourage social science research projects particularly those of a cooperative and multi-disciplinary nature, that tend to meet the problems of national and/or




international scope.

To advocate sound policies for good government that will sustain growth and develop a more egalitarian national community.

To render consultancy and training services in planning, policy making, surveys, feasibility studies, program and project development, evaluation, monitoring and management of socio-economic activities.

The 1992 report, on the other hand, tells us that:

Since the (Research Awards Program's) full operations in 1972, a total of 408 grantees have benefited from RAP including 10 grantees this year. Of these 252 were awarded grants in the MA/MS level; 140 in the PhD/EdD/DPA level; and the remaining 16 were awarded to already established social scien-



In operationalizing its statutory mandate, PSSC has conducted research training programs and funded national surveys, research programs (research integration, thesis/dissertation research and writing, Modern Philippine History Research). An idea of how much PSSC has accomplished along the above lines may be gleaned from two annual reports of PSSC. Thus, for FY 1972-1973, which also includes accomplishments of the previous fiscal year — the first year of full operations - PSSC "(awarded) 23 research grants, 13 of which were for major researches, (trained) 29 faculty members in basic and advance survey research training courses, benefitfing some 24 largely provincial educational institutions ..."

tists needing assistance for their individual research projects.

Of cardinal importance has been the creation of the PSSC Research Network and the Research Consortia.

Not the least for the benefit of its members, PSSC also sponsored and continues to sponsor seminars and conferences — most notably the National Social Science Congress I, II, and, now III; publishes (since 1973) the quarterly PSSC Social Science Information, maintains a Central Subscription Service (the first concrete PSSC assistance to its member-associations); gives a modest subsidy for member-associations' annual seminars, and equally modest grants to individual social



scientists to enable them to participate in conferences abroad. PSSC has been at the forefront in discussing issues of national concern through its Social Issues Committee. Starting this year (1993) it will come out with the first of a multi-volume *Philippine Encyclopedia of the Social Sciences* and, hopefully by next summer, the Summer Training Program will be resumed — initially for college mentors in Sociology, Statistics, History, and Political Science.


PSSC's major organs are the Governing Council, whose members are the representatives of fourteen disciplinal associations representing thirteen disciplines (two for history), and which determines general policy and the Executive Board, which is mandated to carry out the policies adopted by the Governing Council, and whose members are elected not to represent the associations, per

se, but the disciplines. Backstopping both bodies is the Secretariat, now numbering more than twenty personnel, and under an Executive Director, who is chosen by the Governing Council and the Executive Board for a term of three years, but may be reelected.


Twice during the year PSSC convenes the mid-and annual meetings of the Council, which the fourteen regular members and thirty six (as of 1992) associate members are required to attend.



### AGENDA TOWARD

The ever-changing economic, political and social conditions of Philippine society call for a concerted effort on the part of the social science community. The intelligent use of its resources and the effective mobilization of its members to be socially responsible and to actively participate in building a just and humane society are imperative.

The programs and projects implemented by the PSSC over the past decade were based on PSSC's "Agenda for the 1980's" which was aimed at consolidating social science resources for the enhancement of research and training capabilities for a greater impact on the national leadership. Recognizing the need to plan programs and projects in the context of recent social science events, the PSSC has drawn up the "Agenda Toward the Year 2000" which will guide its program planning and implementation for the coming decade to assume a more pro-active role. Following are the major objectives of the PSSC toward the year 2000:

- 1. To influence the shaping of public opinion and the formulation of public policy which will enhance the quality of life.
- 2. To advocate for the development of a just and humane society.
- 3. To facilitate the formation of a critical mass of competent social scientists in the various disciplines.
- 4. To assist the research of member associations, especially in the regions.



### THE YEAR 2000

- 5. To be oriented to anticipatory research in order to reverse trends negative to socioeconomic development.
  - 6. To assist in the publication of scholarly journals.
- 7. To use its publications to indigenize social science theories and research methods.
- 8. To develop a data bank and an information network in the social sciences.
- 9. To regularly undertake professional activities at the local, national and international levels.
  - 10. To achieve financial viability.

The coming decade of the nineties will usher in myriad challenges which social scientists, both as individuals and as an association, will have to face. It is, therefore, imperative for the PSSC to define its role as an organization committed to developing the capabilities and resources of the social science community. It shall have oriented itself to anticipatory research and have used the scientific body of knowledge to contribute to the national development process. A greater impact on policy makers must be made so that the social sciences could provide the base for sound policy formulation. The Council must be able to respond to the need for an institution like PSSC to be an integrated and efficient organization of social science associations — providing directions, taking a leadership and advocacy role, a partnership in which its members share resources and opportunities.
