Foreword

At a time when, in view of the current Philippine situation, non-practitioners and fellow academicians alike are prone to ask of political scientists, half-derisively and half-jokingly, "Are you still around?", the disciples of what Aristotle considered as the most superior of all the sciences can still reply with pride, "Yes, indeed, we're still in business!" For, misgivings and ignorance notwithstanding, the present situation — fluid as it appears to be — only provides more grist for the mill of the astute political observer and serves to whet his appetite to search for better ways of understanding the Philippine polity and perhaps even of influencing or introducing social change in this society.
